REPORTS

LIBRARY REPORT By Jangoo Mistry

Did you know that Zoroastrian legend credits the origin of the human race to the Peshdadian dynasty? Are you aware that Greek historians claim Zarathustra composed more than two million words? While the common

belief is that the Achemenian dynasty practiced Zoroastrianism, do you know that the prophet's name does not occur in any of the inscriptions or artifacts from that era?

We were fortunate to understand some of these rich historical nuggets at a day-long religion education seminar sponsored by your Library Committee on Feb 25. Four eminent Mobeds of the North American Mobeds Council (NAMC) made presentations under the theme, "Passage of Time and its Influence on Zarathushtrian Tradition".

The program started with Ervad Dr. Soli Dastur, from Florida, enlightening the attendees on the "Zoroastrian Connection in Peshdadian and Kayanian Dynasties." Ervad Cawas Desai, from Philadelphia, followed with a very well-researched talk titled "Evolution and Practice of Zoroastrianism during the Achemenian and Parthian Dynasties." Ervad Jehan Bagli, from Montreal, brought to light the practice of Zoroastrianism in the Sasanian dynasty in his talk "Zoroastrian Faith: Revival in Sasanian era." The final speaker, Ervad Kobad Zarolia, president of NAMC, spoke on the stark realities of the "Future of Zoroastrianism in North America."

Just like the previous NAMC seminar we had sponsored in April 2009, this program was also very much appreciated, and concluded with a Q&A session from an animated audience, energized with a wealth of information, asking insightful questions of the learned Mobeds.

The program was well attended and it was refreshing to see even the community's youth in the audience. We are one of the few organizations in North America that periodically invites scholars in Zoroastrian studies to further the knowledge of the community in not only the religious aspects of the faith, but also in Zoroastrian history and culture.

Some time back, the ZAH library had screened a documentary on the plight of poor elderly Zarathushtis in India who cannot afford even one square meal a day due to their meager financial situation. While many of us at that session were deeply touched and went away saddened by their plight, Yazdi & Shahnaz Sidhwa decided to do what they could to address this sad situation. With her daughter's encouragement, Shahnaz has published a beautifully illustrated bedtime story book, "Farmer Brent" for children ages 5 and up, that we had profiled in a previous Manashni. The story teaches how a difficult situation can be salvaged in a humorous manner. And on April 20, Shahnaz is orchestrating an enactment of her story as a play performed by the children of our community. Profits from the sale of the book will be donated to the cause of Zoroastrians in India suffering from hunger. We are appealing to all to give Shahnaz your full support in this worthwhile endeavor.

The ZAH Library is proud to add a significant book to its collection. The book, "In Search of My Master", is written by the famous author Mariorie Husain and displays the 40-year artistic journey of legendary Pakistani artist Jimmy Engineer. The book's full-page color reproductions of scenes from the independence movement of Pakistan, glorious architecture, landscapes, still life, and poverty series of paintings leave the reader gasping in awe. In his career, Jimmy Engineer has created over 2,000 original artworks, and more than 200,000 prints of his work are in private collections in 50 countries. But perhaps more importantly, the book also sheds light on Jimmy Engineer, the man. Though an artist by profession, his true passion in life has always been a deep concern for the welfare of fellow human beings. From an early age, growing up with parents who were always helping and caring for people around them who came to the house with their problems, Jimmy soon became a crusader for the oppressed. He has raised awareness for all kinds of social causes through more than 50 walks and countless awareness programs for handicapped, blind and orphan children. This fantastic addition to our library is of particular interest to us - especially since Jimmy Engineer's parents, brother, sister, and other family are all with us in Houston. Also, you will recall that Jimmy's gift of one of his huge prints is also on display in our library. By Jimmy's request, the book was donated and shipped to us by Dr. Syed Sohail, Chairman of the Jinnah Medical and Dental College in Karachi. The 600-page book has over 500 prints of Engineer's artworks and is impressive just to hold and browse. JAMSHEDI NAVRUZ, MARCH 21ST AND THEREABOUTS (By Pervin Mistry)

Zarathushtis have been celebrating Navruz, which falls around March 21st since time immemorial, since our Peshdadian King Jamshid celebrated it first and which is known as **Jamshedi Navruz!** Jamshid Padshah celebrated this day as the New (nav) Day (ruz) because it is the Spring Equinox when the time of the day and night are equal in length and after the long winter months, warmth returns and the planting of seeds (life) begin. The concept of Spring or Renewal of Life (in March) is universally celebrated by other religions too. It is the universal celebration of new life returning to earth after winter is over! The Christians celebrate it with Easter (eggs symbolize new life); the Hindus celebrate it with Holi (sprinkling colors to signify the rebirth of vegetation). The Shi'i Muslims in Iran and throughout the world have retained the old **Zarathushti** custom of celebrating Navruz in March around the 21st.

Jamshid Padshah (Avestan"Yima") is mentioned in the Zamyad Yasht (Karda VII. 31 to 38); Vendidad (Fragard II); and he is also mentioned in the Gathas (Ahunavad Gatha, Y. 32.8)! So, irrefutably, no Parsi-Irani Zarathushti can deny the existence of Jamshid Padshah as a "mythological figure",or, the New Year he started which is identified as "Jamshedi Navruz"! The Pak Avesta was written in absolute pre-history; written history began only recently compared to the several millennia of history of the ancient civilizations unrecorded by historians in writing! It is held that Jamshid Padshah must have lived about 10000 to 9000 B. C. Dasturji Hormazdyar Dastur Kayoji Mirza has written in Outlines of Parsi History (OPH), Bombay 1987, "It appears that ancient literature, astronomy, and modern science have combined in an effort to ascertain, with reasonable certainty, the place and age in which king Jamshid must have lived. The ancient accounts of 'evil winter, flood, deluge' refer to what is known as glaciation or ice age in geology. Long ago (in 1903) B. G. Tilak based his arguments on Avesta, Vedic and astronomical evidences and arrived at the conclusion that the ancient homeland of the Aryan people was situated near the North Pole or somewhere in the Arctic Circle, which homeland was destroyed by glaciation (Tilak, pp. 453-458)."

Navruz does not happen precisely at the same time and on March 21st because every year the Earth orbits around the Sun not in a precise round circle but in an oval egg-shape orbit. Consequently some minor variations in the astronomical calculations are normal and accepted as far as the precise astronomical moment of the Spring Equinox is concerned. This may explain why the English Gregorian calendar and the calculation of 365 days + the quarter day are also not accurate. The word "Fasli" comes from "fasal" or **seasons**. Avestan words "yairya" mean season and "sared" mean a year. At the time of the Spring Equinox, approximately March 21st, it is the correct time to celebrate the seasonal Jamshedi Navruz (New Day) although we do not follow the Fasli Calendar. The Parsis follow **two** New Years - both declared as holidays in India, one which is Jamshedi Navruz around March 21st and the other falls sometime in August, also called Parsi New Year or Navruz. The last day of the Parsi Year is called "Pateti" meaning prayers are offered to repent, i.e. "pashemani karvi" for the mistakes committed during the past year and to resolve not to repeat the same mistakes and also to rededicate oneself in the service of Ahura Mazda.

It is accepted by many scholars including Muslim Iranian scholars that Persepolis was especially built by Darius the Great as a Zarathushti Religious Center for religious events, the Spring Equinox being one such major celebration. The portals were built in such a way that on the precise moment of the Spring Equinox, always around March 21st, the first rays of the rising Sun hit the entrance to the main Hallway and spread light on the throne of the King. This precise moment celebrated the astronomical event when the Sun passed through all the 12 signs of the zodiac and returned once more to the first sign of the Aries in the zodiac, in March.

In Iran each New Year beginning in March was given a specific animal and color as the mascot for the year. This is not widely practiced among the Parsis of India.

KIDNEY TRANSPLANT HELP FOR A FELLOW ZARATHUSHTI (An appeal via FEZANA)

Daraius Tarapore, a resident of Southern California, USA, has a genetic kidney disease called Polycystic Kidney Disease (PKD), which over the years progresses until the kidney functions get very low and the person would need dialysis and kidney transplant.

Daraius' kidney function is now below 15%.

Thus his nephrologist feels that within 6 months he would need to go on dialysis.

Since, this is a genetic disease his immediate family members including his sisters or sons are not good candidates.

Furthermore, his wife being diabetic cannot help either. The family's hope is to find a good Samaritan who will be willing to be a living donor so that Daraius does not have to go on dialysis.

It is because this specific transplant is more effective when performed before a person is put on dialysis.

Daraius is listed with UCLA Kidney donor program and during the orientation for transplant procedure was advised the following:

- 1. The typical wait time for cadaver kidneys is approximately 8 to 10 years and that living donor is the preferred method.
- 2. People with Polycystic Kidney Disease, Diabetes and other chronic disease would be unacceptable.
- 3. Donors would have top priority and would get at the top of the waiting list if they would need an organ in the future.
- 4. UCLA also has a paired exchange program where they match other donors with recipients if the original pair is incompatible. This means that any prospective living donor whose blood type does not match with Daraius can also participate.

Please note that Daraius has full medical coverage that will take care of all the transplant related expenses. His medical insurance will also pay for all the expenses for the donor including hospital stays and laboratory tests.
