The North American Zarathushti Congress 2024 (NAZC 2024) By Kayo Sidhwa

Faith, Fellowship, and Growth: A Four-Day Congress Inspires the NA Zoroastrian Community

Over four transformative days, members of the Zoroastrian faith gathered for the 18th North American Zoroastrian Congress, an event filled with worship, spiritual enrichment, and fellowship. Held at the Royal Sonesta Galleria Hotel, the Congress drew 700+ attendees, creating a space for connection, renewal, and collective growth.

The Congress opened with a spectacular show "Visions of Paradise" followed by a rousing keynote address by the legendary Zoroastrian Bollywood star, Boman Irani, focusing on our theme, Generation Z: Propelling Zarathushti Resurgence. Each day was thoughtfully structured, featuring a mix of sessions, workshops, and panel discussions that addressed various topics related to our religion, history, culture, and contemporary existence.

Our theme, Generation Z: Propelling Zarathushti Resurgence resonated powerfully throughout the event and our goal of having at least 40% of our attendees under 40 years was successfully achieved. Attendees left with a sense of empowerment and tools to carry the message of faith back to their communities.

Highlights of the event included:

Day 1: The opening ceremony set the tone with an inspiring call to action, followed by a vibrant evening consisting of the Rhythm India dance performance and the Denim and Diamonds themed evening show termed "The Good, the Bad and the D'ugly". The icing on the cake was some melodious songs by our Keynote Speaker, Boman Irani jamming with our home-based Z-Band.

Day 2: Engaging sessions and panel discussions allowed participants to explore their faith in practical ways, while youth programs encouraged the next generation to deepen their connection. The evening program started with a Play in our ethnic language followed by DJ Gary making all dance to his beats.

Day 3: It was a very captivating one particularly for the Young Adults with many relevant current topics facing our Community. The Congress came to a close with a spectacular Magic/Illusion show followed by a passing the torch ceremony where the Co-Chairs passed the torch to the organizers of the next Congress in Sacramento in 2028. Once the multi course dinner ended, DJ Masti took over and regaled the attendees making them dance the night away into the wee hours while welcoming 2025 at the stroke of midnight.

Day 4: The final day which happened to be New Year day was capped with an auspicious prayer service at the Zoroastrian Center in Houston followed by lunch where participants renewed their commitment to our

Zoroastrian mission before the attendees headed back home.

The Bapsi Sidhwa Award

Two years ago, the Bapsi Sidhwa Literary Prize was established. It was awarded for the first time at the 2022 Zoroastrian World Congress. The award honors our very own, the late Bapsi Sidhwa, who passed away last December. The ZAH Library administers the award under the sponsorship of the Zoroastrian Association of Houston (ZAH) and FEZANA Information Research Education System (FIRES). The Award, a brainchild of Aban Rustomji, addresses two separate needs: (1) recognizing Bapsi for her contributions to fictional literature and (2) the need to showcase and recognize the wide swath of talented Zoroastrian authors.

The first inaugural award was awarded at the 2022 World Zoroastrian Congress in New York to Tanaz Bhathena, who won the prize for her work "Hunted by the Sky."

The second Bapsi Sidhwa Literary Prize was awarded to Roxana Trabulsi, who accepted the award at the 2024 North American Zoroastrian Congress in Houston in December. Roxana's compelling novel, "Of Mud and Honey" is a poignant story of kinship, hope, and transformation. Submissions for this award were particularly strong with entries from Zoroastrian authors across, India, the United Kingdom, Canada, and the United States. A distinguished panel of judges selected the winner, who received a commemorative medal and a cash prize.

Nawaz Merchant, who writes under the pen name of Nev March was also recognized with an honorable mention for her acclaimed work "The Spanish Diplomat's Secret".

Bapsi Sidhwa herself was looking forward to presenting the Prize, but sadly, she passed away just a few days before the award ceremony. (These books and many others by Zoroastrian authors like Thrity Umrigar, are in the ZAH Library collection).

The Rohinton Rivetna Outstanding Zarathushti Award

This prestigious award recognizes a Zarathushti who has made outstanding contributions to further the cause of Zarathushtis in North America and all over the world. Leadership and selfless service to the community for several years deserves to be recognized and this award does that.

At the 2024 NAZC in Houston, this award was given to our very own Aban Rustomji, chair of the ZAH Libray Committee, active sponsor and leader of FIRES, and an ever-present driving force in organizations and events all over North America. For over 60 years, Aban has championed intellectual growth by organizing lectures and presentations that preserve and promote our culture and religion. Through her untiring efforts, and her husband Purvez's support, she has strived to continue the legacy of community service and philanthropy of her parents and grandparents in Pakistan.

Through her vision and work, Aban has built vital hubs for Zoroastrian scholarship, preserving manuscripts, archiving stories of first-generation immigrants, establishing the Bapsi Sidhwa Prize, and supporting research efforts that preserve our heritage. Her "legacy", the ZAH Library, now houses over 1,500 books and notable collections of precious manuscripts and artifacts. Several North American and World Zoroastrian Congresses have relied upon Aban's contacts and her worldwide network to put together the program that brings so many distinguished speakers from all over.

Way to go, Aban! We are proud of you and forever appreciative of the example you have set for the younger generation and the legacy you have left behind from your selfless work over six decades.

A Trip Down Memory Lane

The Purvez Rustomji Room has a special treat for all Zoroastrians—especially Houstonians. The walls are plastered with a unique display of historical documents, photographs, and chronicles of significant events that eventually led to the establishment and building of the ZAH Center and the Atash Kadeh.

The "Founding Fathers" of this country are often remembered for the Constitution they gave us in 1787. It's only natural that we also remember the "founding members" who had the vision to start and shepherd the Association and the buildings that we enjoy to this day. Putting this together required going through countless notes and documents needed to draw a timeline of the last 50+ years that records steps that have brought us to this day. Photographs tell the story – photographs that recall the pioneers and their efforts through the years. You will chuckle at how much people have changed through the years and make you say, "I didn't know that ….!"

In Memoriam: Bapsi Sidhwa

It is with a very heavy heart we announce the passing away of our dear Bapsi Sidhwa, wife of Late Noshir Sidhwa on December 25, 2024 (12:17 a.m.). She is survived by her brother Feroze Bhandara, sister-in-Law Shernaz Bhandara; daughter Mohur Sidhwa; son Khodadad Kermani, daughter-in law Bakhtaver (Baku) Kermani; and daughter Parizad Sethna, son-in-law Khurshed Sethna, grandsons Zersis, Cambayses and Behram Kermani and Nozar Sethna; nephews Zubin, Berzin and niece Zareen Bhandara.



Bapsi Sidhwa was a pioneering literary voice whose works transcended boundaries and bridged cultures. Born in Karachi, raised in Lahore, a proud Houstonian, and beloved around the world, Bapsi was a storyteller of remarkable depth and insight. Her novels illuminated the complexities of identity, history, and the human spirit, resonating across generations and geographies.

Through seminal works like Ice-Candy-Man and The Crow Eaters, Bapsi masterfully wove narratives that captured the struggles, joys, and resilience of communities often overlooked. She brought the Parsi experience to the forefront of English literature, creating unforgettable characters and vivid worlds that showcased the diversity and richness of South Asian life. Her evocative prose not only shed light on the tumultuous histories of Partition and cultural diaspora but also highlighted universal themes of love, survival, and humanity's enduring strength amidst chaos.

Within the global Zoroastrian community, Bapsi was a trailblazer and a beloved figure. She brought the Parsi ethos to life in her work, portraying with warmth and wit the traditions, challenges, and indomitable spirit of this small but vibrant community. Her contributions extended to her active involvement in the Zoroastrian Association of Houston (ZAH), where her warmth, humor, and generosity of spirit touched the lives of many.

Bapsi was more than a literary icon. She was a mentor, an advocate, a role model for women, and a beacon of hope for marginalized voices. Her indomitable spirit, sharp wit, and profound compassion left an indelible mark on all who knew her.

To honor the life and work of Bapsi, FIRES (a FEZANA Committee) initiated the Bapsi Sidhwa Literary Prize in 2022, an accolade that continues to nurture and celebrate literary excellence. This award stands as a testament to her unwavering commitment to storytelling and her belief in the transformative power of words.
