Exciting News Coming Your Way – The Zoroastrian Heritage Museum

After much discussion and deliberation by the ZAH Executive Committee and other leaders of our community in North America, an exciting new idea is gathering steam.

There is going to be a proposal to be put to vote at the ZAH Annual General Meeting for a Zoroastrian Museum in Houston. The Museum will be a dedicated sanctuary designed to safeguard, interpret, and showcase the profound religious, cultural, and historical legacy of our community. It will serve as a bridge, connecting the wisdom of our ancestors to the curiosity of future generations and the global public.

Why A Zoroastrian Museum

- **Cultural Continuity:** As our diaspora grows, a physical anchor is essential to prevent the dilution of our unique traditions, languages, and rituals.
- **Educational Outreach:** The museum will be a premier resource for scholars and students, offering an authentic narrative of Zoroastrianism's influence on world philosophy and human rights (such as the legacy of the Cyrus Cylinder).
- **Public Presentation:** By opening our doors to the world, we replace misconceptions with understanding, fostering a spirit of *Good Thoughts, Good Words, and Good Deeds* for generations.
- **Picture** interactive displays of the *Shahnameh* or the history of the Silk Road come to life as you have never seen before.
- **Picture** a "Modern Literature Wing" dedicated to contemporary Zoroastrian authors, especially showcasing the works and authors who have won the Bapsi Sidhwa Literature Prize and other book awards.

Important to Know

- ZAH has agreed to donate the unused land on our property *at no cost and for which no other use is planned*.
- ZAH will not incur any financial obligation. Every penny for the construction and operation of the museum will come from external sources and fundraising efforts.

ZAH will soon provide a detailed proposal, before the AGM, to assist you in making your decision.

A Call to Action

The creation of this museum is not merely an option; it is a responsibility. We urge every reader, community leader, and benefactor to lend their voice and resources to this landmark project. Your support will ensure that the flame of our history continues to burn brightly for centuries to come.

We stand at a pivotal moment for the preservation of our identity. Let us build this home for our heritage together. ZAH is already recognized as the pioneer of successful initiatives like our Centre and the Atash Kadeh. With the addition of a museum, Zoroastrians from all over North America will come to Houston to experience our "complex" of religious offerings.

Yes, you will have questions – lots of questions. But for now, all you need to do is vote on the concept, not the nitty-gritty details. This is not going to happen overnight. There will be lots of time to discuss and argue, and look at different ways of doing it.

Jashne Sadeh is one of the most ancient and symbolic festivals celebrated in the Zoroastrian tradition. Observed about **50 days before Navroze and marking approximately 100 days and nights remaining until the end of winter**, this festival centers on **fire, light, and the human ability to overcome darkness through wisdom and cooperation**

On February 8th, the Houston Zoroastrian Study Group began an introductory deep dive into our Gathas. Traditionally believed to be hymns composed by Zarathustra himself, the Gathas imbibe the core spiritual teachings of our faith and focus on humanity's moral responsibility to choose *asha* (truth) over *druj* (falsehood). These hymns serve not only as prayers but also as philosophical reflections on justice, truth, and the purpose of human life.

On February 15th, our Atash Kadeh received a major facelift with the help of our ZAH Middle Group and Youth Group. We want to extend a heartfelt thank you to our amazing volunteers who dedicated their Sunday afternoon to cleaning, polishing, and doing an incredible amount of (literal) heavy lifting. Your willingness to serve the community reflects the true spirit of cooperation, humility, and care that strengthens our Atash Kadeh. As a result of your hard work, the prayer hall remains a welcoming and peaceful space for all persons of our community. The past year was indeed noteworthy: 17 new members and eight functions, with five at our popular ZAH Centre and three at restaurants, including that at Moody Gardens in Galveston by bus. We celebrated the new year in January with traditional dhandar patio, on Valentine's Day, the gentlemen among us whispered sweet nothings to the maidens fair and all of us paid tribute to our moms on Mothers Day. We had our friends from China, Japan, Thailand, Goa, and India-Pakistan prepare for us their mouth watering specialties. Thoroughly enjoyed our good ol' American fare too. Realizing that we had missed out our Bohri friends, we decided to give them a go at our first event in 2026.

It was a double feature the afternoon of February 21. Members of Golden Group were treated to wine and then lunch prepared by Bohri chefs of Houston, followed by an entertaining presentation by Conor Hagen of FBI on scams. The gathering was the largest ever recorded: 78 members and two guests. The number would have been larger but for the horrendous traffic jam which led to seven members returning home frustrated. Full marks to those who after struggling through the traffic for nearly 90 minutes made it to our ZAH Centre. Round tables were arranged facing the stage for the guests to get a good view of Mr Hagen's overhead slide presentation on the main hall's large screen.

Bar B Q Village, known to several in our community, did a great job in cooking up a Bohri meal: chicken curry in creamy white gravy, bohri beef cutlets, chicken farchas, naans and, of course, mutton biryani without which a Bohri feast would be incomplete. The sole vegetarian among us was offered veg biryani and cutlets and dal. Helping Hands Diana Balsara and Anita Kavina, assisted by two maids helped serve the food to the guests. A pile of soft napkins were placed on the table for those who were finicky licking their fingers clean. Chocolate cake rounded up lunch with tea and cookies later on. For the convenience of our guests, several of them being octogenarians, but not showing it, a bottle of drinking water was set before each. The charge for all this was only \$25 for members and \$30 for non-members.

Before lunch, new members Yasmi & Rustom Engineer, Shaheen Rustom and Delna Minwalla were recognized. With the induction of 17 new members in 2025, total membership rose to 120. Lunch over, it was time for the keenly awaited talk by our guest speaker, Mr Conan Hagen, of FBI, on scams and frauds, how to detect them and how not to fall for them. His enlightening presentation with slides on the large screen at the back of the stage was listened to with rapt attention. As seniors, not getting younger any more, we tend to be not only gullible but also fallible when it comes to scams and scared to death, particularly on receiving calls telling us that someone close to us is in trouble and needs financial aid immediately. Conan advised us not to respond to the caller but to contact the person to find out whether that is true. He recommends not to speak over the 'phone if the caller is not known to us. Wait for the caller to speak and if uncertain of the subject, put the instrument back on its cradle without uttering any explicit in the vernacular. (The last few words that of the scribe and not Conan's.) It's your voice that they want to record which they then use to call unwary friends for favours. He

VIRTUOSI OF HOUSTON HONOURS - ZARINE & MEHERWAN BOYCE

Zarine and Meherwan Boyce come to mind whenever mention is made of Virtuosi of Houston. The couple were the patron saints of the orchestra comprising talented youngsters in their early to late teens. No adults, except for the two world class conductors, Andrzej Grabiec and Franz Anton Krager, who not only founded the orchestra in 1996 but weaned and stood with it all these 30 years.

But, more was needed. That's where Zarine and Meherwan come in. Zarine, born in India and educated in Pakistan and the UK, well known for her floral crafts and husband, Meherwan, from India but settled in good ol' Texas for umpteen years, whose pioneering in turbines has brought him world wide fame. They made names for themselves in their respective fields but their passion was the performing arts in Houston and that's where the Virtuosi came in. Together they provided the financial foundation and artistic vision that transformed Virtuosi into a top class orchestra of the young. This gave the children an avenue to exhibit their talent. Zarine, who served as the Chairman of Virtuosi for 17 years, realized that many of the youngsters did not have the means to acquire their musical instrument. With Meherwan's full and active support, the couple came up with a rescue plan: hold lavish parties at their palatial home, attended by the elite of the city to raise funds to not only purchase equipment but to send them twice, or more times, to perform on stage in Europe before knowledgeable audiences who lauded their talent. Can you imagine how delighted the kids must have been and how proud the Boyces must have been to have made that possible? Zarine was exceptional when it came to raising funds for a good cause. Exuding charm, she succeeded in renting a large area in the Memorial City Mall for a studio for rehearsals for just one dollar a month. No kidding! Allowed to attend on a few occasions, I saw at first hand how devoted the two conductors were and how quickly the kids learnt from them.

Sillie and I must have attended practically all the concerts of Virtuosi as their guests as must have several among our community. A friend once asked me why do I bother to attend concerts performed by unacclaimed kids. I replied rather harshly, I must confess, saying if I were to close my eyes when the Virtuosi is playing, I could swear that it is the superb Houston Symphony performing. Yes, they are that good.

The Boyces were instrumental in establishing the concerto concerts, giving opportunity to soloists to exhibit their talent. We are very appreciative of the Board of Directors for honouring Zarine and Meherwan at the 27th concerto concert on February 28, 2026, before a packed audience. Glowing tributes were paid by David Voll, Sr., President of the Board, and by the two conductors. A video presentation familiarized the many who may not have come in contact with the honorees and made us feel so proud of our hamdins. Thanks to Mr Voll, several tickets were allotted gratis to our ZAH president, Aderbad Tamboli, for distributing among fellow Zoroastrians. And, what to say of the concert itself? What can I, except that it was outstanding. All the selected soloists – an unusual duo too – played superbly. But one, a thirteen year old girl, flawlessly playing the difficult violin concerto by Mendelssohn, was outstanding. Truly a virtuoso. Z and M would have been overjoyed. I closed my eyes, quite sure that it was Midori playing to the accompaniment of the Houston Symphony.

REMEMBERING HOSHANG SETHNA

A Life of Adventure, Enterprise, and Community

Hoshang Sethna lived a life defined by adventure, enterprise, faith, and an unwavering commitment to community. Born in Karachi, Pakistan, he spent his formative years in Sukkur, a small but close-knit Zoroastrian community of about forty individuals. Those early years left a lasting imprint on him, shaping his deep sense of belonging and responsibility toward community life. He went on to study mechanical engineering at the prestigious NED University of Engineering and Technology in Karachi before traveling to England for higher studies. Upon returning to Karachi, he married Arnavaz, beginning a lifelong partnership built on shared values of family, faith, and hospitality.

Hoshang was an entrepreneur long before the word became fashionable. Among his early ventures was repairing ships in Karachi's busy harbor—work that combined his engineering skills with his natural instinct for enterprise. Adventure, however, was always in his heart. When the opportunity arose to move to the United States, where his sister-in-law lived in New Jersey, he seized it with enthusiasm. Soon after arriving, he bought a car and set off on a journey across the US. Driving was one of his great joys. Friends often marveled at his uncanny sense of direction—he seemed to possess an “inbuilt GPS” long before such technology existed. His travels brought them to Houston, where he immediately liked the climate and sensed opportunity in the growing city. Hoshang embraced his adopted country wholeheartedly. He proudly described himself as an American first and loved flying the American flag.

Determined to connect with fellow Zoroastrians in Houston, Hoshang and Arnavaz looked through the telephone directory, and reached out to Zarine Boyce and Nargesh Sethna. Community life in Houston soon became central to their world. When his father, T. R. Sethna—a respected Zoroastrian scholar—visited Houston, he encouraged Arnavaz and Hoshang to help nurture the religious education of young Zoroastrians. Taking that advice to heart, they opened their home for Sunday School. For seventeen years, their home was filled with children learning about their faith and heritage. There were always lunch after, and along the way the children would help themselves to the bowl of chocolates or candied almonds always available to them.

Hoshang's professional life in Houston was dynamic. He opened his own automobile business and later joined Boyce Engineering, which took him on assignments as far away as Venezuela. Never one to shy away from opportunity, he invested in six oil wells in Seguin. When the oil crash forced him to sell them for a pittance, he simply shrugged it off, confident that everything in life eventually falls into place.

Hoshang devoted immense energy to the local Zoroastrian community. At the Zoroastrian Association of Houston, he was always ready to lend a hand. If something needed fixing, Hoshang was there—often literally up on the roof at a moment's notice, repairing something, fixing pipes, adjusting switches, or tackling whatever task needed attention. No job was too small, and no request was ever turned down. He was also an integral part of the formation of the Zoroastrian Heritage and Cultural Center. In those early years, when the vision of a permanent community center was just taking shape, Hoshang was among the many dedicated volunteers who rolled up their sleeves and worked tirelessly to make that dream a reality.

Hoshang Sethna leaves behind a legacy not only of adventure and enterprise, but of generosity, and community spirit. Hoshang and Arnavaz's home bustled with students, relatives, laughter, and conversation—truly a gathering place for people of all ages. Our Zoroastrian Heritage and Cultural Center depended on the detailed care and maintenance that Hoshang lovingly dedicated to it. Hoshang's commitment to ZAH was matched to his steadfast support of Arnavaz in her integral role of establishing ZAH and making sure we were all connected through newsletters, emails, phone calls, and community events. There was not a single newcomer who was not welcomed and established by the Sethnas.

Through his quiet generosity, steady hands, and adventurous spirit, Hoshang Sethna helped build the foundation of the community we cherish today.

SCIENCE AND THE ZOROASTRIAN RELIGION

Science is defined as the fundamental knowledge of the universe gained by human observation and experience. Science extends beyond the physical sciences—physics, chemistry, engineering; it includes the study of people as individuals, communities and societies.

The object of science is to understand how nature works by observing the natural and physical world to improve the lot of human beings. Science also encompasses an understanding of human interactions, and the consequences thereof, for the betterment of humanity. It is this knowledge that Zarathustra gave humankind.

“Zarathustra was master in natural observation...His observation, his experience and knowledge helped him to his final beliefs and conclusions...His religion is not a mere idealism; it is an induction from facts...The Gathas show: The beginning and end of everything in the natural world occurs according to the known laws of nature”. (1).

For humans to live by the laws of nature for a harmonious life is specified in the Gathas: *O, Ahura Mazda! When Thou first created the world and with your innate wisdom you created the laws of the universe and bestowed upon us corporeal life and wisdom; you gave us religious laws for us to use and with our will to make the right choices; to live by those fixed laws for a good life.* (Ys 31.11).

Rastamji Edulji Dastoor Peshotan Sanjana, the High Priest of Bombay in the 1920s, is unequivocal in stating that “Zarathustra’s teachings constitute a true religion which is not only not contrary to but in precise harmony with nature...The Zoroastrian dogmas, doctrines and principles cannot be thoroughly impressed upon the human mind unless they are shown to rest upon natural grounds, upon a firm scientific foundation, upon the facts of nature...” (1).

Social scientists explicitly state: Living in accordance with the laws of nature and fulfilling one’s duty constitute the essential principles of all morality and are characteristics of all moral persons. It is such individuals who realize everlasting happiness. (2).

This is an echo of a principle Zarathustra established millennia before social scientists voiced this fact: *Fully aware that only by obeying the laws of Ahura Mazda (acting in accordance with the laws of Nature, i.e., attributes of Ahura Mazda) can I accrue the advantages of a good life and that by conforming to righteousness (Asha) using my Good Mind (Vohu Manah) is the only path to an exalted abode.* (Ys 28.4).

That the Zoroastrian religion firmly rests on the laws of nature (science) is unmistakable.
