

FAITH, FELLOWSHIP, AND GROWTH: A RECAP OF THE 1STH NORTH AMERICAN ZOROASTRIAN CONGRESS

The 18th North American Zoroastrian Congress (NAZC), held at the Royal Sonesta Houston Galleria Hotel in Houston from Dec 29th 2024 to Jan 1st 2025, brought together over 700 attendees for four transformative days of worship, learning, and fellowship. Themed "Generation Z: Propelling Zarathushti Resurgence," this biennial gathering highlighted the role of youth in shaping the future, with an impressive 42% of attendees under the age of 40. From captivating performances to thoughtprovoking discussions, the Congress celebrated the enduring spirit of the Zoroastrian faith.

Lighting the Fire

Before starting the Congress, Mobeds and Mobedyars from across North America and the world congregated on the stage and lit the fire followed by reciting the Atash Nyaesh prayer, the words and meaning of which were also displayed on the screen for the audience to follow along.

A Grand Opening: Visions of Paradise

The Congress began with a spectacular opening ceremony featuring *Visions of Paradise,* a theatrical production. Inspired by the Persian Garden (*Pairidaēza*), the performance traced its historical roots from the Achaemenid Empire to modern-day Houston.

Once the opening show concluded, City Council Member Letitia Plummer, At-Large 4 presented the Proclamation where Honorable Mayor of City of Houston, John Whitmire proclaimed Dec 29th 2024 through Jan 1st 2025 as Zoroastrian Days in Houston.

Keynote Moments and Youth and Young Adults (YAYA) Involvement

Later that day, Irani's impromptu songs with the Z-Band brought an added layer of charm to the evening. His keynote was followed by the Youth Keynote speaker Sanaya Master aptly representing the Congress theme.

Youth participation was a cornerstone of the Congress. The dynamic Young Adults of the Zoroastrian Association of Houston (YAYA) team organized engaging activities, including a Silent Disco and Bollywood dance workshops. These events energized younger attendees and fostered camaraderie and a deeper connection to their heritage.

Through leadership, programming, and participation, they demonstrated the pivotal role of youth in shaping the Zoroastrian community's future.

After all, a Zarathushti Congress cannot be complete without religious debate and discussion. The opening Ceremony began with priests across North America gathering in their priestly attire on the stage in front of the burning fire and reciting Homage unto the Fire prayer

Throughout the Congress there were sessions discussing religious nuances as well as debates on various topics between the Youth, Young adults and the young at heart.

Dynamic speakers, panelists and experts provided much food for thought with lectures and interactive panel discussions on various topics related to our religion, history, culture, and contemporary existence.

Their incredible contribution and service to the ZAH community and the Zarathushti community at-large is immensely appreciated.

Fun and laughter were woven into the Congress through events like the *Pestonji Pakrai Giya* (a parsigujarati comedy play), an enchanting magic show on New Year's, spectacular dancing by Rhythm India dancers, DJ Gary and the Z-Band rocking the house with foot stomping music. These performances provided much-needed moments of laughter and relaxation, balancing the intensive discussions and networking opportunities.

Planning and logistics

Organizing an event of this scale requires careful planning and coordination. Each day was meticulously planned to provide the audience with the best experience possible. The logistics and details for accommodations, banquet room setups, catering, décor, theme of the day – everything was superbly executed to the minutest detail.

Pre-congress activities were arranged to show out of town audiences a good time by taking them on tours in and around Houston such as Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, Port of Houston, NASA. The theme nights were designed to give a taste of Texas as well as honor our Persian heritage and our Parsi culture. Transporting the audience to the Zarathushti Heritage Cultural Center and Bhandara Atash Kadeh on New Year's Day for New Year prayer service and lunch was a feat in itself. The fun continued with a cruise from Galveston departing Jan 2nd 2025 on Royal Caribbean. We Zarathushti Houstonians do know a thing or two about Southern hospitality.

A Memorable Conclusion

The Congress culminated in a moving New Year's Day prayer service conducted by our Head Priest Vada Dasturji Khurshed Dastoor, and a passing-the-torch ceremony to Sacramento, the host city for the 2028 Congress. Throughout the Congress, keynote speakers, interactive sessions, and cultural showcases reinforced the strength and unity of the Zoroastrian community. Youth-led initiatives like *"Bridging the Gap: Preserving Zoroastrian Heritage with Gen Z*" showcased the innovation, creativity, and passion of younger generations. *"The Great Zoroastrian Debate"* tackled sensitive topics like interfaith marriage and the relevance of religion for today's youth. Real-time voting and audience participation made this session dynamic and inclusive, offering a platform for diverse perspectives.

These sessions emphasized solutions to identity challenges, highlighting the importance of cultural preservation through education, historical projects, and global networks. They underscored a vital

truth: the future of Zoroastrianism lies in empowering youth to embrace their heritage while reimagining it for a modern world.

Religious Understanding

Sessions such as "Zarathushtra's Gathas and the Art of Living" offered fresh perspectives on the



relevance of the Gathas to contemporary life, while *"A Gateway to Zoroastrian Renaissance:* offered two key viewpoints on understanding the origin and significance of the Zarathushti doctrines and exploring Zarathushtra's principles through the lens of Asha through science. These

Well-attended and deeply resonating with the audience, it highlighted the need for tailored processes to foster spiritual leadership and create consecrated worship spaces—a vital step forward for Zoroastrians in North America.

The Jungalwala Lecture

Miguel Ángel Andrés-Toledo delivered the prestigious Khorshed Jungalwala Lecture, encouraging youth to delve into Zoroastrian history and philosophy. His eloquent address highlighted how ancient teachings could inform modern challenges, though the lack of youth attendance was a missed opportunity for engagement.

- Breaking the Chains of Bias: Reclaiming Zoroastrian Unity in North America This session emphasized the urgent need to bridge divides within the community, highlighting inclusivity and mutual respect as essential for preserving Zoroastrianism's legacy in the diaspora.
- Good Stress and Minimizing Bad Stress
 Bridging Zarathushtra's emphasis on balance with modern neuroscience, this session offered techniques to harness good stress (eustress) while minimizing bad stress (distress).
 Mindfulness, gratitude, and living in alignment with Asha (truth and order) were presented as tools to build resilience in today's chaotic world.
- Sessions exploring global narratives were *"Tajikistan's Persian Zoroastrian Heritage"* and *"Zoroastrians in Iran: Speaking About Their Religious Life"* provided rare insights into the lives of Zoroastrians worldwide. These presentations deepened attendees' understanding of the faith's diverse expressions and challenges across different regions.
- "Sustainable Philanthropy" emerged as a key theme, with panelists emphasizing long-term, impactful giving. Scalable solutions to critical challenges encouraged collaboration between generations to ensure a vibrant future for Zoroastrians globally.

Community Engagement and Advocacy

Several sessions addressed community engagement and advocacy:

"Make Your Voices Heard" This interactive session invited participants to present ideas for strengthening the Zoroastrian community. Topics ranged from inclusivity in interfaith families to retaining youth engagement and defining Zoroastrian identity.

The **YaYA team** at NAZC 2024 was a dynamic force, with over 30 youth and young adults from Houston and beyond, united by a passion for Zoroastrianism. Their goal was clear: to make youth a central focus at the congress, and with over 42% of attendees under 40, they succeeded. The theme, *"Generation Z: Propelling Zarathushti Resurgence"*, highlighted the power of youth in shaping the future of the faith.



Pre-Congress Activities

Two days before the congress began, 200+ youth gathered for an exclusive pre-congress experience, which included a group walk to Houston's Water Wall, icebreakers led by Zoroastrian Youth of North America (ZYNA), and a visit to NASA. Youth also enjoyed a rooftop holiday lights experience at The POST Houston and a lively Texan-style evening at Bayou Heights Biergarten.

Silent Disco

A standout event during the congress was the Silent Disco. From the moment attendees walked in and put on their Silent Disco headsets, the entire room was transformed into a vibrant dance floor, with everyone on their feet dancing freely to the beat of their chosen channel in their all-white attire and neon lit accessories. The event was organized by the YaYA team with great guidance and help from the NAZC Operations and AV teams. The YaYA Team also took on roles as DJs, bouncers, and setup crew, ensuring an unforgettable experience for everyone involved.


After a morning filled with industry and logistics, the group made their way to the

The program started with the Zarathushtis of Houston welcoming one and all with a nice and lively Texan theme. This newest and still unfolding chapter in the Zarathushti story was right before

the audience made the segway to the ancient world under the Achaemenids, probably the oldest chapter in the Zarathushti story.

The pageantry of the various eras was on full display with the underlying theme of the Persian Garden weaving its journey throughout history and across various geographies.



The history of the Persian Garden starts with Cyrus asking his subjects to dig the ground with shimmering water gushing out from behind the rock (the wings of lights in the costume gave an effect of shine!) and providing the life force for the beautiful Persian Garden!

From then on, the audience had to strap in for a truly spectacular extravaganza of color, sound, dance and a large dose of "PRIDE" through various grandiose segments portraying 2,500+ years of history in 45 minutes journeying through various eras and locales that included Iran (PERSIAN GARDENS): Pasargarde, Persepolis/ Babylon/Ctseiphon, Isfahan; India: Mughal Agra; Europe: Rome, Versailles, Spain, Austria; and North America.





There were some truly memorable and noteworthy events: the singing by various participants was of exceptional quality (they sounded like trained opera singers), the water flowing out the rock at the start was impeccable in its timing and was mesmerizing in terms of the dance steps and the lights in the costume giving it a "sheen of light on water" effect, the trees and flowers were joyful to watch, the memorable dance recital in the India segment, the pomp of Rome, the statue gracefully dancing in Versailles, the lively


Pestonji Pakrai Giya
